spring?" The weatherman is forced to live this most mundane day over and over and over again until finally, like Ebeneezer Scrooge before him, he is transformed by the process and becomes a better human being.

Groundhog Day has its roots in a religious celebration known as Candlemas. February 2 marks 40 days after Christmas and commemorates the presentation of Jesus at the Temple. In some traditions, people bring their candles to their local churches, where they are blessed by the church and used for the remainder of the year. These blessed candles serve as Epiphany symbols of Jesus Christ as the Light of the World.

Somehow, Pennsylvania Dutch settlers brought the tradition from the old world where, if a hedgehog (later groundhog in the Americas) pokes its head out and sees its shadow on the day of Candlemas, Spring will remain elusive for at least six more weeks. No shadow equals an early spring. Who came up with this? No matter how you look at it, it's a peculiar practice.

In the bleakness of February, there are a lot of ways that we humans have tried to give ourselves something to look forward to. In addition to Groundhog Day, we celebrate Super Bowl Sunday, Valentines Day, Presidents Day (an amalgamation of Lincoln's Birthday February 12 and Washington's Birthday February 22), and every four years, Leap Day on February 29. In addition, Mardi Gras usually falls during this month, too. February feels like a month that we have filled with events to intentionally cheer ourselves up and give us something to look forward to because, if we didn't, the bleakness and monotony of winter might overwhelm us.

Usually toward the end of the month (this year February 22) we have Ash Wednesday and the beginning of the six-week journey of Lent. The word "Lent" is derived from an old

Who was Saint Valentine? Legend has it that he was a Catholic priest and doctor who became famous for performing secret weddings during a time when Emperor Claudius II had outlawed new marriages for young men. (Claudius thought unmarried men made better soldiers.) Upon discovery, Valentine was sent to jail, where he befriended his jailer, and his jailer's blind daughter, Julia. Emperor Claudius offered to pardon Valentine and set him free if Valentine would renounce his Christian faith and agree to worship the Roman gods. Valentine's refusal led to a death sentence. Before he was killed, Valentine wrote a last note to Julia which is said to have cured her blindness. He signed the note: "From your Valentine."
