The future is a hard thing to accurately anticipate, but there are people who seem to be better at it than others. (And it doesn't just rely on their internet bandwidth!) Microwave Ovens, Smart Homes, Streaming Entertainment, yes! Flying cars, jet backpacks for everyone, living on Mars, not yet.

Recently, I watched an interview conducted by David Letterman of two of the founding members of the Irish Band U2. Bono and "the Edge", their stage names, have been together as musical brothers since meeting in Dublin in the 1970's. They are well known for their music and lyrics (One, Beautiful Day, I Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For) and for their charitable work, especially in Africa with AIDS prevention and treatment. When they talked about each other, Bono said of Edge tongue in cheek, "He's from the future." Unfazed, Letterman asks Bono, "Does he say what the future is like?" In this season of resurrection, we hear God's promise to make things better. A time when, "He will wipe away every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death, or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away." Revelation 21:4.

In the meantime, we continue to do our work. I read a post on Facebook from a friend who works to make things better in her community. The work she does around housing is important, but hard. In addition, she was in a terrible car accident two years ago and she has had to struggle with new physical limitations. Yesterday, she wrote a post, including a
