Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I hope you are enjoying your summer so far. From a practical perspective, the season is more behind us than ahead of us. If summer is the time between Memorial Day and Labor Day, we are already two thirds of the way through. It always goes too fast.

As a kid, I always measured "summer" as the time between when school got out for break and the first day of school in the fall. After a few days of adjustment in early June, my days started to fall into a rhythm, with activities, adventures, chores, swim lessons, and playing "kick the can" until the sun went down.

With my oldest two grandchildren (6 and 8) on summer break, we have developed a rhythm with them as well. Most Friday nights, the boys and Kate come for dinner and a movie or a family game, and then they all spend the night with us. Saturday mornings it's pancakes or waffles and then some simple little adventure, like the Farmers Market, haircuts, or a trip to the Human Bean for slushies. Then Kate takes the

boys on a hike or a bike ride or for a swim. Something to try to get the wiggles out, which with these two, is a nearly impossible task.

Over this summer's break, Karen has set aside some time every Saturday for reading with each of the boys. Just Charlie or Lucas with Grandma. They have a special chair in Papa and Grandma's room where this happens. They take turns reading the story and sounding out words. Each boy has seen real growth in their reading proficiency, but the time spent together is what everyone will remember.

I remember that the summer between third and fourth grade, I was sent home from school with multiplication flash cards. We had been learning our multiplication tables (1's through 12's) at the end of third grade, and my teacher didn't want us to lose what we had learned. (Or rely on the tables printed inside our Pee-chee folders. For anyone under 40, ask your elders what a "classic" Pee-chee is). So I practiced throughout the summer and the answers to those problems became second nature. I recognized the problems and knew the answers by heart. No need to count on my fingers or toes.

Summer in the church is sometimes referred to as "Ordinary Time". The readings from the lectionary that we use each Sunday tend to emphasize growth and discipleship. These last few Sundays in July, we have been reading from the parables of Jesus from the Gospel of Matthew. Each begins with , "The kingdom of heaven is like..." or "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to...". Like all of the parables of Jesus, these stories are set in relatable circumstances and pertain to situations that the original hearer could relate to. Seeds, and yeast, and crops, and treasures and fields.

We read these parables again and again, because we believe that in doing so, we too might begin to recognize the in-breaking of the Kingdom in our everyday lives. Just like

practicing our reading or our multiplication tables helps them to become second nature to us, reading the parables of Jesus helps us to learn how to interpret the world through the lens of faith.

In fact, I think just about any of us, given a little time, could create a decent parable or analogy for the Kingdom. I'll take a stab at it. "The kingdom of heaven is like a grandparent reading to their grandchild, sharing the story together and learning from one another." Or, "The kingdom of heaven is like a sleep over, where ordinary things become special and the bonds of love are strengthened."

I bet you could come up with images of the Kingdom on your own, from your own experiences. Just look around you. It just takes some practice, like reading and multiplication.

May God answer our prayer when we say, "Your kingdom come."
