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wife and mother of a teenage daughter, she writes a little about her philosophy of life. A terminal diagnosis often leads the recipient to life review. Her personal philosophy was, and always had been, "Life is all about a series of moments." and "I plan to spend as much remaining time as I can savoring each one."

Her "body of work" includes a book on the history of ice cream in America, a family that she adores, and numerous spontaneous trips, including one to Oregon to view the 2017 eclipse. "I have never had a bucket list; instead I said yes to life." And looking at the comments section in the article, her essay in the Post has touched so many. Her reflection on her life will become a part of her "body of work" as well.

What will your "body of work" be? As our congregation approaches our 125 th anniversary, what is Christ Lutheran Church in Aurora, Oregon's body of work?

I hope looking back, we can think about the word's of Mother Teressa, who summed up her

body of work this way...

"If you can't do great things, do little things with great love. If you can't do them with great love, do them with a little love. If you can't do them with a little love, do them anyway."

In the book of Acts (9:36-42), when a follower of Jesus named Dorcas, who was devoted to good works and acts of charity passes away unexpectedly, Peter is summoned to see what he could do. When he arrives, the mourners stand beside Peter, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing Dorcas had made while alive. What most people remember is that Peter raised her from the dead. This is pretty remarkable. But the part of the story that sticks with me is, "What a gift that Dorcas left tangible signs of God's love with her community in the form of tunics and clothing for those in need.

ventures spoke with pride as they showed friends and family that they had been a part of something great.

Maybe they riveted steel girders together, or hauled wheelbarrows full of concrete, or hung wire on electrical towers. They were a small part of something great. And so are we.

As the Body of Christ, the little things we do with great love are also a part of something great.

Some will be remembered. Others will be known only to God. No regrets. I'm sure there are pictures of them on refrigerators all over heaven.




