The Communion of Saints and Grandma's Breakfast Club

Dear Friends in Christ,

I want to share a story about a grandma, a group of high school students, and one possible image for what it means to be the communion of saints.

In October of 2021, freshman Sam Crowe and his friends from Bishop DuBourg High School in St Louis were hanging out at a local diner for breakfast during a late start Wednesday. "This place has nothing on my Grandma Peggy's", Sam bragged.

He floated the idea with his friends and checked with his grandma. "Would you be willing to host us for breakfast next Wednesday?" That started a tradition where up to thirty of Sam's friends started showing up at 7:00 a.m. on Wednesdays for breakfast before school.

The kids started calling it "Grandma's Breakfast Club". Grandma Peggy Winckowski says, "Wednesday is my favorite day of the week. I will feed them as long as they come."

Eggs, pancakes or French toast, bacon, cut up fruit, chocolate milk, Sunny Delight are on the menu. Sometimes donuts or homemade cinnamon rolls too. For the first year, Grandma Peggy paid for this out her own pocket. Others in the community have heard about the Breakfast Club and donate to the cause.

These gatherings took on a much bigger and sadder meaning when her grandson Sam, 15 at the time, was killed in an auto accident in July of 2022.

On the day of his death, many of Sam's friends gathered at Winckowski's home to console grandma and each other. "We were grieving with grandma," one of Sam's friends said.

As summer came to an end and school was ready to start up for the fall, Grandma Peggy told the teens that they were still welcome for breakfast. More students than ever showed up. Even some friends from another nearby High School.

"He would have wanted this to continue, so we're going to continue it," said Sam's friend Jeremy. "We're all there for each other."

Before or after breakfast, this little community often gathers in Grandma Peggy's garden where she has built a little memorial for Sam. They pray for one another.

Aside from Wednesdays, students stop by from time to time to visit. Grandma Peggy always keeps her refrigerator stocked with snacks and sodas.

"Being around her makes me cheerful," said Harrison Newcombe, 16, a close friend of Sam's, who visited on a recent Saturday with several friends.

"It melts my heart every time they show up," Winckowski said. I've lost my 15-year-old grandson, but in his place, Sam gave me 30 extra grandbabies," she continued. I think Sam is directing this from above."

I think God created human beings to be in community with one another. As Saint Paul says, "Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep." (Romans 12:15). Grandma's Breakfast Club sounds a lot like this kind of community.

On most All Saints Sundays, I describe the purpose of the day as follows. "To remember those who have died for the faith, those who have died in the faith, and for all the baptized."

What better tribute to Sam is there than to know that those whom he loved (his grandma and his friends) now love one another in a way that heartens everyone who hears his story. They share a meal, stories about Sam, and pray for one another. The community grows and his story inspires.



GIVING TREE IS COMING AGAIN! JESUS IS THE REASON FOR THE SEASON

Every year we help needy families in the North Marion area at Christmas time. We will set up in the basement as we did last year since it was much more organized than it was previously. Below is a brief explanation and a calendar of times when we can use help.

WHAT IS THE GIVING TREE ALL ABOUT? WHO DO WE HELP?

Congregation Members contact Pastor Craig with names of families with children who need help at Christmas with their permission and gift information

Transitional Shelter Family if we have a family at the time **Families from North Marion School District** through the counselors

HOW DO WE DO IT?

We get gift suggestions from the families and try to fulfill their wishes. We give two clothing items and two toys, jewelry, etc. to children and two household items and perhaps one clothing item to parents. We provide Christmas dinner and staples for a month or more.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

Check sign up to help with preparation of the Giving Tree and/or to sort and make shopping lists, shop, wrap gifts, prepare for delivery, deliver to families.

Donate money, separate from normal giving, designated "Giving Tree" to buy whatever is needed to complete the gifts and food donations. Place cash in a pew envelope and mark it Giving Tree or write Giving Tree on memo line of check and place in offering.

11/19-12/3

Giving Tree tags are available to be taken Sunday before Thanksgiving.

Take tags, leave tracking portion, return wrapped gifts WITH ORIGINAL TAG taped to package.

12/3

Last day to take a tag.

DEADLINE

12/10 Last day to return wrapped gifts and nonperishable food.

12/11

Shop for unclaimed gift tags and nonperishable food.

12/12 11:00-1:00 pm

Wrap gift purchases, check to be sure we have all gifts; arrange for purchasing any missed gifts: organize nonperishable food on each family's table.

12/22 3:00 to 6:00 pm

Deliver perishable food to basement in a.m., sort onto family tables, and deliver 'Christmas' to families

12/22 10:30 to 12:00 pm

Deliver perishable food to church.

12:00-3:00 pm

Sort perishable food to each family table

3:00-6:00 pm

Deliver CHRISTMAS
