scription from Alex and Dan to a something called, "Storyworth".

I had heard about Storyworth on OPB radio. It's a service that sends out prompts weekly by email and invites you to write reflections on the questions. Some are suggested by the gift giver. Others, you get to choose from a list or make up for yourself. After a year, what you write is compiled into book form and printed for you and your family to have as a memento. I've written two short essays so far. It's strange to think that this collection might someday be read by my grandchildren. Hopefully, something new about me or my life will be revealed on the pages. Or maybe a wellworn story will bring a smile of remembrance years down the road.

As the New Year approaches, everyone seems to be focused on summing up the year. What celebrities and luminaries have passed away in 2024? What major events will we remember. Was it an "Annus Horibilis", as Queen Elizabeth once proclaimed, or was it a banner year? Or maybe, a little bit of both?

I remember learning in seminary about a prayer form, rooted in the Hebrew Scriptures, that always begins with a story about what God has done in the past. Only after that, is there a petition or request. An example might be, "O God, as you heard the cries of your people in bondage and brought them out of Egypt, deliver all in bondage to sin and show them your forgiveness."

This past year was one of major "retrospection" for our church. We celebrated 125 years as a congregation this past May, with music and stories and

gratitude for those who had gone before us. We pulled out mementos and pictures and remembered the saints, those long gone as well as those more recently departed. We looked back (retrospection), told our story as a community of faith, and gave thanks.

The next part, for the years to come, is to finish the prayer. "O God, as you have blessed our congregation with leaders and friends these many years, help us to move forward in our ministry, confident in your grace and empowered by your gospel of love." What stories are we writing with our lives that will be remembered by future generations of God's faithful people?

For our first Christmas together as a couple, Karen presented me with an album of pictures from our first eight months as boyfriend and girlfriend. She had surreptitiously been taking and collecting photos of us throughout the year and collected them into story form with captions (some quite funny!) that told the story of "Craig and Karen, 1983". It was the first chapter in a story that thankfully continues more than four decades later, with children, and grandchildren and friends added along the way.

For 2025, my prayer is that you might look to see how your story is a part of God's story. As you look back, look to see where God's grace has been revealed to you and give thanks. As you look forward, ask, "What new chapters is God writing in?" What's your "Storyworth"?

Oreo Cookie Balls



INGREDIENTS

1 pound chocolate sandwich cookies, crushed

1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened

1 pound vanilla-flavored candy coating, melted

INSTRUCTIONS

Place the creme cookies in a gallon-sized bag and remove all the air. Using your hands or a rolling pin, crush the cookies to a fine powder. You can also use a food processor.

Transfer the cookie crumbs to a large mixing bowl and add in the softened cream cheese. Mix well.

Line a tray or baking sheet with parchment paper. Form the dough into small (1-inch) balls and place on the baking sheet. Freeze the Oreo balls for 20 to 30 minutes.


